Youth Policy Guide: Transitional Independent Living Planning (TILP)



What is a Transitional Independent Living Plan (TILP)?

"I.N.D.E.P.E.N.D.E.N.T. Do you know what that mean?!"

- The TILP is a goal-setting document that you fill out with your social worker to get you ready for independence and determine what is needed for you to reach your goals.
- Independence and self-sufficiency pretty much mean that you are expected to do things on your own.
 - Your medical, educational, and social needs all start with you. The TILP is designed to get you ready to navigate these areas on your own after you exit foster care.
- If you're 16 years old or older, you should start the TILP and update it with your social worker every 6 months.

How do I know if I'm ready to be independent?

- DCFS uses the <u>Casey Life Skills Assessment (CLSA)</u>: determines a youths level of independence.
- You can fill it out with your social worker in-person or online
- Your score helps create the goals for your TILP

What does the TILP look like?

My social worker keeps mentioning the Independent Living Program (ILP). What is ILP?

- If you were in foster care at any time between the ages of 16 and 18 you are eligible for ILP services until you are 21 years old.
- ILP services are meant to help foster youth live independently. Services include:
 - <u>Education</u> Scholarships, tutoring, and GED completion, college skills
 - <u>Career Development</u> work readiness trainings, employment experience,
 JobSource/YouthSource Center
 - Mentorships ILP referrals/ self referrals(supportive adults), Individualized Transitional Skills Program (ITSP)
 - <u>Daily Living Skills</u> information on and training in, money management, budgeting, personal/professional skills, self-advocacy, household skills, etc.
 - <u>Financial Resources</u> financial support such as, clothing allowance, money for books and school supplies, transportation, and food.
 - <u>Housing Information</u> Information and referrals about transitional housing and other housing programs, including Section 8 and low income.

What if I am not eligible for ILP because I exited foster care before I turned 16?

- There are additional programs/services however, if you were NOT in foster care between the ages of 16 and 18 you are not eligible for ILP services.
- Your social worker connects you with other services that you are eligible for.

Who supports me while I transition towards independence?

- You have a wide support network made up of two teams. (1) Your Core Team and (2)
 Your Support Team
- Core Team: Ideally, made up of foundational relationships to help you reach your goals.
 - a. Youth
 - b. Social Worker (CSW)
 - c. Foster/ Kinship Parent or Agency
 - d.Group Home
 - e.ILP Coordinator

- 2. **Support Team:** Made up of service providers and professionals who can further support you and your core team.
 - a. DCFS Staff (ex: juvenile court staff,
 - wrap-around, etc)
 - b. ILP service provider
 - c. School
 - d. County Counsel

What happens after the TILP and I'm accepted for ILP?

- Your TILP gets updated every 6 months
- Your Social Worker, LP coordinator, and the YDS Division should provide follow-up services
