Has the caregiver been trained by a health care professional to meet the special health care needs of the child? Does the caregiver have the experience, ability, and child-specific training to accommodate such a child? Is the caregiver willing to attend necessary training to assist him/her in meeting the child's special needs? Is the child a gender and within the age range that a caregiver can accept? If the child to be placed, or any child already in the home, has a history of sexual activity, is the caregiver able and willing to appropriately supervise him/her? Education of the Child	 Does the location of the caregiver's residence allow the child to remain in his/her school of origin? If the residence is outside of the attendance area of the child's school of origin, is the caregiver willing to transport the child to his/her school of origin, if requested? If the child has an Individualized Education Plan (IEP), can the caregiver meet the needs of the IEP?
Language	 Is the caregiver willing and able to communicate in a language the child and/or his/her family speaks

Race/Color/National Origin of the Caregiver and the Child	 Is it necessary to consider the child's needs related to race, color, or national origin when placing him/her? If not, such factors must not be taken into consideration. Can the needs of a child be met by a prospective caregiver or adoptive parent who does not share the child's racial or ethnic background?
Religion	Is the caregiver willing and able to maintain and support a child's participation in a preferred religion, in religious activities, or in the preferred religion of his/her parents?
Reunification	If the case plan is reunification, is the caregiver willing and able to cooperate with the plan?
Sexual Orientation	Is the caregiver willing and able to accept the child's sexual orientation?
Sibling Placement	 Is the caregiver willing to accept sibling groups? Is the caregiver willing to be a placement for a child's sibling(s) or half-sibling(s)?
Social	 Is the caregiver willing and able to: Maintain and/or engage the child in his/her extracurricular and enrichment activities? Maintain the child's significant friendships? Work with the child's social limitations and abilities? Accept the child's reasonable

	personal possessions using the prudent parent standard.
Visitation	 Is the caregiver willing and able to: Ensure the child's participation if there a visitation schedule for the parents? Monitor visits appropriately? Ensure grandparent visitation, if applicable? Maintain sibling regular visitation and contact, if applicable?
