The following Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) codes are used in the WIC 241.1 Joint Assessment Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) to determine which status the youth falls under and which agency will lead in meeting the youth's needs.

	 In order to be eligible for DEJ, all of the following criteria must be met: The youth has not previously been a 602 ward due to a felony. The offense charged is not a felony listed in subdivision (b) of WIC 707. Dual Supervision DCFS Lead Agency The youth has not previously been committed to the custody of the California Division of Juvenile Justice. The youth's record does not indicate that probation has ever been revoked without being completed. The youth is at least fourteen (14) years of age at the time of the hearing.
